DORNOCH HERITAGE SCIO

Annual Report 2023-24

1. Introduction

DH SCIO became a SCIO (SC008747) in November 2011 and our purposes are as set out in our Constitution. www.historvlinks.org.uk (About us). These are:

- The advancement of education, arts, heritage and culture relating to the history of Dornoch and surrounding district.
- The advancement of heritage and culture relating to Dornoch (and adjoining areas of the Highlands if relevant);
- The maintenance of a museum in Dornoch to make the above heritage accessible for all to enjoy.
- To promote community engagement and to encourage heritage research within the community.

These purposes are to benefit the community of Dornoch and all postcodes within the IV25 postcode sector. The collection area is some 100 sq miles; from Dornoch, north to The Mound, west to Rogart, Lairg, Bonar Bridge and back eastwards to Dornoch. Our main work is the running of a community-led independent museum, Historylinks. We employ a Curator, Museum Assistant, Outreach worker and Children's Club Leader.

2. Activities during 2023/4

We have continued to open our doors to the public from April to October offering permanent exhibitions and displays, a children's room and an annually changing temporary exhibition. In 2023 we highlighted the career of Dornoch-born Royal Naval diver and Air Sea Rescue Officer, Chris Murray, whose exceptionally brave rescue work earned him the Queen's Gallantry Medal.

We continue to offer a children's Heritage club, the Young Curators, now in its fifth year. Two young people have now 'graduated' as Club and Museum volunteers. The heritage-themed fun and educational programme continues to be very popular for the 8-12 age group. Work experience students from Tain and Dornoch Academy also assist during school holidays.



DH SCIO is a membership organisation, now comprising 257 members. We continue to organise monthly heritage talks for our members during the winter/spring season which are also open to the public. Talks in 2023/24 have been wide ranging and fascinating. The membership sub-committee also raises much-needed funds through holding twice yearly coffee mornings and sales, and a sell-out 'Taste of Burns' evening in January.

The main focus of the Board in the past year, working with the Curator, has been on raising the necessary funds to construct and fit out of an extension to the existing Historylinks Museum, the Historylinks 'Heritage Hub'. After three years of work to raise funds from Heritage Lottery, Museums Galleries Scotland, a range of trusts, foundations, the local authority, Dornoch Common Good Fund and with the generous support of Dornoch Heritage members and businesses in our community, we raised in excess of £600,000. Construction began in November 2023 with a completion date of May 2024.



3. Impact of Historylinks

The permanent collection in the Museum is of high quality and comprehensively presents the environmental, historical and social evolution of Dornoch and the surrounding area of East Sutherland. Every year our Curator and the team research and present an innovative special exhibition. The Historylinks online archive www.historylinksarchive contains over 15,000 entries and is accessible to the public.

Visitor feedback from the survey we carried out in season 23/24 confirmed high levels of visitor satisfaction and enjoyment. A low percentage of users lived in Dornoch and the age range of visitors was predominantly over 50, although many family groups visited and appreciated the museum. From this feedback we need to continue to reach out to local people and under-represented groups such as young people.

Historylinks makes a significant impact on the community of the town. Our outreach programme engages many people not previously involved in heritage in creative workshops and learning experiences, and we offer a significant programme of talks and fund-raisers in the winter season which regularly attract 60 or more participants. We are a membership organisation and enjoy wholehearted support from our 250+ members. In a recent fund raising appeal we received in excess of £25,000 towards the building of the Heritage Hub to complete the package of funding from other sources.

We have been approached by other independent museums and heritage centres for advice on areas such as raising funds from eg Heritage Lottery Fund, how to attract and sustain a team of volunteers, and how to construct and manage an annual budget.

In terms of the local economy, Historylinks makes a significant contribution. We employ four staff from the area, we employ local tradespersons, we purchase supplies locally whenever we can and we source stock for our retail area from local artists, craft workers and Brora Social Enterprise. As a destination attraction we contribute to bringing visitors to Dornoch who generate income for self-catering providers, cafes, shops etc.

The Heritage Hub represents a step change for Historylinks. We will have substantially more gallery space to exhibit our collection, a great deal of which has had to be kept in store. We will also have a community room for the first time, enabling us to provide heritage workshops on our own premises, special one off cultural events, opportunities

for the community to research and curate their own exhibitions, and a home for the Young Curators group.

4. Volunteers

Historylinks has a small staff team and volunteer support is therefore of paramount importance to support the range of our work; including front of house, archiving, fund raising, talks and tours and support to the Curator in the exercise of her role. The Museum sub-committee has the key role in the latter. The value we place on volunteers cannot be overstated and without them we could not offer the range and quality of work to which we aspire. We have a strong body of volunteers as can be seen from the SCIO organisational chart www.historylinks.org.uk. Succession planning is a constant theme on our agenda and we have welcomed two new Board members during 2023/4: Fiona McKinlay and Richard Hickson. Board members continuing in office are Alison Davies and Andrew Senior, Co-Chairs, and Jerry Bishop, Treasurer. We also plan an independently led Board strategic review in the coming year to review our governance performance.

5. Future priorities

In 2023/4 the Board and Museum sub-committee have been preparing for the Museums Galleries Scotland re-Accreditation process in June 2024. This involves meeting the high standards in terms of Collection Care, Conservation, Access, and related policies and plans.

We have committed the reserves accumulated by our members' fund raising over the years, to the building of the Heritage Hub. We will continue our policy of retaining a reserve of 4 months operational funding which would be called upon for emergency purposes.

The fit out of the Heritage Hub and the roll out of the Community Activity Programme will be top priorities for 2024/5, fulfilling the plans we have drawn up to create an exciting new space for visitors and for the local community.

Longer term, the next chapter for DH SCIO is realising our aim to become more self-reliant from a financial perspective and in the coming year the Board intends to review Board performance and draw up a new Business Plan to take this goal forward.
