

SUTHERLAND LONGHOUSE PROJECT: Visit to the Highland Folk Museum at Newtonmore

What a fantastic trip today! Glorious weather, an enjoyable ride in our hired minibus (thank you to our driver, Ian, for the smooth run there and back) and a wonderful tour led by Curator, Liz English. We began in the Museum store - an amazing Aladdin's cave with chairs, and pony traps, and farm and domestic tools and cribs and textiles and every artefact imaginable - galore! A quick lunch in a comfortable room set aside for us for the day, and then we set off on the mile-long walk across the site to the reconstructed preclearance township. Here Liz showed us around the tacksman's house, the weaver's house and the corndrying kiln. Walking around the buildings, inside and out, we got a real sense of what life might have been like for the families who lived in 'our' settlement at Dalnamain. Taking a while for our eyes to adjust to the gloom, we took in the strong pervading scent of peat from the central hearth; the hard earthen floor; the thick heather thatch resting on the strong cruck frame; and the wooden box beds built for communal sleeping - 3 or 4 to a bed, each occupant slumbering in a sitting position. Outside, Hanes Schnell demonstrated thatching with heather - well over a thousand bundles of heather required to thatch the tacksman's house alone - hours of work collecting the heather and many more completing the thatching. There simply was not time to take it all in - but this was a wonderful taster and I'm sure we shall each return in our own time before too long.
